
Books for Classrooms Summer Forum – July 19

Caring through Dementia Network

Caring thru Dementia is an ongoing ministry of this church, dedicated to providing information, support, and resources for families and individuals living with this disorder. Dementia is not a disease, but a symptom or rather a series of symptoms impairing cognitive, behavioral, and physical capacities. The leading cause of dementia is Alzheimer's, a disease which causes about 60% of all dementia cases. Other causes include vascular dementia, Lewy-Body dementia,



Parkinson's, and other conditions. Aging is the highest corollary for dementia, but all of us don't get dementia.

Can Dementia be Prevented? We'll explore this question at the next "Caring thru Dementia Network" on Thursday, July 13, at 3:00 pm. Like heart disease, the incidence of dementia is diminished with better nutrition, fitness, and mental well-being. The Caring thru Dementia Network is a continuing ministry meeting on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month; it is open to the public, and there's no charge.

We are a connectional church, and it was good to be able to be with old friends and new friends in person. With that in mind, I bring you greetings from Jeanne Festa, former Associate Pastor, and Louie Lyon, former Pastor. Two of our former District Superintendents were not in attendance– Mark Conrad



has moved and is now with the Baltimore Washington Annual Conference and Dottie Escobedo-Frank was at the California Pacific Annual Conference as their new bishop – the first bishop from our conference.

Our newly appointed bishop, Carlo Rapanut, opened the session with a powerful message, on this year's theme-based on Genesis 32 and 33, Luke 22–24, Esau Wrestling with God.

We are wrestling [but not with each other]!

We are engaging...with each other!

We are rising... above the ways we have failed as a Church, especially by not doing more for the marginalized in our society!

I can tell you-we are in good hands with Bishop Carlo.

While the clergy met, we had our Laity session. Bishop Carlo stayed briefly to greet us and to remind us of the importance of the laity to the church since the time of John Wesley. Then Kelly Deyoe, the South District Coordinator of Lay Ministries led us via zoom. He stressed the importance of the laity in sharing the Good News, reminding us that we can be witnesses by example, without even saying a word. But we are to preach the gospel at all times and, if necessary, use words. There are various tools and classes available to help us. To find out more, feel free to ask one of us, or go to the conference website

Report on General Conference 2020–it will be held in 2024! I felt like I was in an Abbott and Costello "Who's on first?" skit when the delegates to the General Conference were talking. However, the General Conference will take place April 23rd through May 4 in North Carolina, with our delegates from 2020.

I will not go into all of the business of Annual Conference--adoption of reports, budget and resolutions. I will say that it is official, Reverend Doug Handlong is appointed to lead us for another year. Many of the resolutions that passed were to correct past failings, as the Bishop said in his opening comments. We have information on one of these concerning greenhouse gases, and how to become a more environmentally friendly church. If one of you would like to take the lead on forming a task force for this, please see one of us or Pastor Doug.

I have to say-in all of the years I have been attending Annual Conference, both here and in Western New York, this Annual Conference was the least contentious, and the most moving one I have attended. Tears and joy. Speeches that brought us to tears (at least me) and moments of great joy-the incredible success of our missions projects. Support for earthquake relief in Syria and Turkey, medical debt relief. (The US is the only country with this problem), and support for the Ukraine. So far, over \$30,000.00 has been raised in our Conference.

We mourned Church closings and celebrated new & vital ministries.

We had a moving lesson on Pronouns, and why they matter.

The youth in attendance reaffirmed their pledge to Do No Harm, Do Good, and Stay in Love with God, adding, and to Eat Ice Cream. Amen to that!

I am proud, and honored to be a member of an Annual Conference and a church that is willing to wrestle with different issues, engage in dialogues with each other, and rise above our past to the glory of God, as followers of Jesus Christ.
