Last month I wrote to you and shared about our new governing structure here at UMCGV. At our November 2022 church conference, we adopted a simplified accountable structure which allows a single board to serve as the primary overseer of all essential administrative functions of the local church. This includes all matters related to personnel policies, financial matters, and facility maintenance of the local church.

One of the biggest questions that many people ask when it comes to the adoption of this administrative model is in regard to other committees and how other ministries are done in the local church.

As we have witnessed, over the last year, at times ministries are born and flourish on their own. Two great examples are the Caring Through Dementia and the Refugee Resettlement Ministry teams. Both of these emerged out of studies and people feeling the call of the Holy Spirit to rise up and take on a new ministry. Other ministries like the United Methodist Men and United Methodist Women, HOPE Lunch, Patio Sales, Knit and Sew, Men's Bible Study and Monday Funday are ongoing. Ministries like these require little committee oversight or management. There are countless other ministries that have yet to come to life.


Do you have an idea for a ministry? Maybe God is calling you to lead a study group, a prayer ministry, a meditation group or a mission team? Here is what I would encourage you to do. First share that idea with a friend or two. Test the waters. Let that be the beginning of your ministry team. Having a strong beginning and a solid foundation is essential for any ministry to succeed. Pray for that ministry. Pray for guidance, direction and patience as it comes to be. Remember a seed planted today does not bear fruit overnight. Then bring your idea to one of the pastors. Myself, Pastor Ken or Pastor Jerry can give further guidance in birthing a new ministry and providing resources that may be needed.

Ministry happens when each of us shares our passions, gifts and callings not simply when a committee does the work, or a paid staff person does it all for us. The ministry of the church is our shared work and our calling.





Ukraine UMC Support

February 24th, 2023, marked the 1-year mark for the war in Ukraine with Russia. In the past year, thousands have died, been injured, and lost loved ones. Millions have lost their homes; cities have been completely destroyed. The Methodist clergy continue their ministry with all people of Ukraine, offering food, clothing, shelter, schooling, migration to the western part of Ukraine, and so much more. Our support and prayer are critical.

RIP Medical Debt

As medical costs continue to escalate, more and more people are struggling with medical debt. Through this initiative, debt can be relieved by helping families return to financial health. From the RIP website, they share: nearly 50% of U.S. adults delayed or skipped medical care due to the high costs of treatment; 50% of U.S. adults wouldn't be able to afford an unexpected \$500.00 bill; and -2/3 of bankruptcies cite medical debt as a leading cause. Let's help! Rev. Jen Lambert of Red Mountain UMC has already been involved with RIP Medical Debt relief and can attest to the miracles when \$10.00 donated purchases \$1,000 in economic relief for those experiencing bankruptcy due to their medical bills.

Turkey & Syria Earthquake Relief

Since February 6th, the day of the first earthquake to strike Turkey and neighboring Syria, national and international news organizations have carried stories of the total devastation and overwhelming numbers of lives lost. Complete cities were leveled, with nothing left. There is a belief that literally hundreds of thousands more lives are buried underneath the rubble. UMCOR has provided financial assistance since day one; volunteers from all over the world have traveled to help dig through the rubble, stone by stone. Miracles have occurred finding some people alive, more than 200 hours after that first quake. A second series of earthquakes hit on February 20th. The official death toll has exceeded 50,000 as of February 24th.

What is notable about all three projects is the ongoing nature of needed support and prayer.

Turkey, Syria, and Ukraine will need support for families to rebuild entire lives – shelter, clothing, food, schools, even businesses – the very economics to make life whole again. Yet in each of those countries, there is one constant – Hope. People "of" hope, living into Hope. All three countries need yes, our financial support, but also our prayers – our continuous prayers as we are taught to do by the God who loves us without ceasing.

In our own country and, in this case, our own states – we know the deafening effects of inflation and how crushing medical debt can be – both for those who have insurance and for the many who do not or who's coverage simply does not address the escalating cost burden. The weight of debt is so great, families must declare bankruptcy and determine a way to survive. *Billie Fidlin*

Refugee Resettlement Task Force

The Morales family has now been in the USA for 13 weeks as of May 4. They are friendly, highly motivated and appreciative of our help. We have assisted them with outings specifically to the grocery store and to various appointments. They are now fully documented. The men both have 30hr/week jobs as bakers and the adult son (Brian) has just been accepted to another job as a short order cook for another 30 hours/week. They go to a Latino Baptist church. We have assisted with a referral to AA for one of the family members. Brian, after some tutoring by Bill Vorhees, passed his driver test and went out and bought himself a car.



We have been seeing the family with a frequency of twice a week. Last week they were here in Green Valley for a cookout at my house along with all our task force people that could attend.

Our goal for this family has been to help them assimilate to this new culture and help them become independent. At this time the disabled daughter, Maryori, is still not in school; we are going to be leaning on LSS to get the school district to move on this. The family with our help has an application in for Maryori to be approved for pickup by the SunRun as she is physically and mentally disabled. If that happens, the family will be independent for transportation.

This summer our task force will be small but, hopefully for us and for the family, our role will be more limited – in providing friendship and help where needed. We had a well advertised open meeting on April 1 for which we only had 5-7 guests. Some of these folks were already engaged in refugee and immigrant work and some came to learn. Nobody signed up to the task force. Nobody from the congregation came except task force folks. LSS has sent us a formal thank you; that card is on the Bulletin Board. Plans for the fall are pending,


